The May Lectures

The May Lectures, 1987, will be held at Regent's College, Inner Circle, Regent's Park, London NW1 on Saturday 30th May. The subject is "Emerging Models and Values in Western Science", and a notice is enclosed. It is hoped that as many members as possible will be able to join us on the day. The beautiful location will now be familiar to many who have attended previous events.

Instead of having three speakers, we have decided to experiment with a format of two presentations in the morning followed by panel comments initiating the afternoon discussion. Professor Arthur Ellison will be a familiar figure for many readers as a former President of the SPR and Chairman of the Theosophical Research Centre. The other speaker is Dr Christopher Thomson, whose first degree was in economics, before going on to a Ph.D in Chinese scientific and technical language. He did biochemical research in pathology at Leeds University, and then had a spell working for the Bank of England. Subsequently he spent nine years as a solicitor practising in the Scottish courts. His current activities include teaching the "New Economics", setting up an advisory committee on natural medicines, and putting together a course on complementary medicine with one of the panel members, Professor Brian Goodwin of the Open University. The other panel members are Professor Derek Bryce-Smith and Dr Peter Fenwick, chairman of the Network Council, who is also chairing the day.

Dr Lawrence LeShan will be giving a lecture entitled "Healing and the Clairvoyant Reality" on Tuesday 21st July at 7.30 at the Institute for Complementary Medicine, 21 Portland Place, London W1. The draft programme is as follows:

- 2. Some ecological principles a discussion of the observations and descriptions of Scott-Williamson within a broad biological framework.

- 2. Looking into-future prospects.

This seminar will only be open to members, and will probably be limited to about 15 people. It will be of particular interest to doctors concerned with community health.
