APPOINTMENT OF DIRECTORS, 2011

The Directors wish to bring the Articles of Association of the Company on the number of Directors and the quorum required for Board meetings into line with current practice and therefore at the Ninth Annual General Meeting, to be held at New Place, Shirrell Heath, Southampton, Hampshire, S032 2JH on Sunday 10th July 2011 at 12-30 p.m., it will be proposed that the following resolution be approved as a Special Resolution:-

Amendment of Articles of Association

It is resolved that the Articles of Association be amended:-

- (1) by deleting in Article 27.1. (a) the words 'not less than six and no more than nine persons elected by the members of the Company' and substituting therefor the words 'not less than five and no more than eight persons elected by the members of the Company':
- by deleting in Article 27. 1. (c) the words 'not more than three additional Directors coopted at any time by the Board of Directors' and substituting therefor the words 'not more than two additional Directors co-opted at any time by the Board of Directors' and
- by deleting in Articles 34 the words 'Unless otherwise agreed in General Meeting, the quorum necessary for business to be done at a meeting of the Board of Directors shall be six' and substituting therefore the words 'Unless otherwise agreed in General Meeting, the quorum necessary for business to be done at a meeting of the Board of Directors shall be half of the number of directors actually holding office (fractions rounded down) plus one.'

If this resolution is agreed, the Board of Directors will consist of up to 10 directors, up to 8 of whom are appointed by the members at the AGM. Up to 2 more may be co-opted by the Board itself. Each year the one third of the member appointed directors, who have served the longest, retire by rotation and all the co-opted members. They are, if they wish, eligible for re-election or co-option. The members retiring by rotation at the AGM in 2011 are Professor Bernard Carr (Chair), Dr. Christopher Lyons (Treasurer) and Mr. Martin Redfern. Dr. loannis Syrigos, who has been co-opted since the last AGM, also retires under the Articles. All are eligible for re-election or co-option and all have indicated their wish to continue. The remaining Directors are Ms. Jacqueline Nielsen (re-elected 2009), Dr. Amit Biswas (2010), Professor Marilyn Monk (2010) and Mrs. Claudia Nielsen (2010)

There will be, therefore, four vacancies to be filled at the AGM in 2011. Members who wish to be considered for these vacancies are requested to apply by the end of May, 2011 by sending their C.V. and a short note on how they see themselves contributing to the aims of the Network. This will enable the Board to consider how they would match the tasks to be performed and, where appropriate, make recommendations to the members. If there are more applicants than vacancies, a vote will be taken at the Network AGM in July. The members of the company will follow the recommendations of the Network AGM, unless there is good reason not to do so. Friends of the Scientific and Medical Network LEO HOBBIS

The Friends of the Scientific and Medical Network, which had been meeting in Auckland since 1996, has now been formally wound up. Our meetings were no longer well-attended and it had become increasingly difficult to persuade members to serve on our Steering Committee. During 2010 we held no regular meetings but we did organise a successful one-day conference in conjunction with the Auckland Central Group of the Sea of Faith Network; the conference theme was Engaging with the Sacred—What does this mean in today's world?

Members of the 2009 committee continued in office during 2010 but the committee was unable to suggest a viable model for the FSMN as an ongoing institution. Much had changed since we first started meeting some 14 years ago. In particular, internet communication had burgeoned in a way that allowed people enormously to explore and expand their interests. The initial enthusiasm of members waned as many moved on to follow their interests in new groupings. The serving committee members were most reluctant to continue and there seemed little prospect of a suitably fresh committee being elected. The Committee therefore proposed to the Annual General meeting last November that the FSMN be formally wound up. The process had to be a formal one since we had a written constitution as a registered NZ Charitable Entity.

The AGM passed the resolution to wind up and the formal process has been completed. Former members may still meet occasionally on an ad-hoc basis.

SMN Sydney JO DE GROOT

Report of Meeting 30th January 2011

An exciting afternoon was had at the home of David and Jean Ingman in Killarney Heights, Sydney. A number of new friends joined us for a wonderfully erudite talk with discussion by **Edi Bilimoria**, education officer with the Theosophical Society of Australia, on the topic 'OKAY, I'M DEAD – NOW WHERE DO I LIVE? WHAT'S MY POSTCODE?' Edi had been active in England lecturing for the SMN as well as the Theosophical Society and his talk reflected his broad background of knowledge as an engineer, with a love of music and the esoteric writings

Edi began by explaining the similarities between the Theosophical Society and the Scientific and Medical Network. In both organisations the highest goal to be pursued is truth. Both encourage the pursuit of wisdom and insight through open-minded and rigorous thinking, and no member or visitor is forced in any way to accept or reject a proposed thought. The concept of truth was likened to a see-saw where on the downward side there was the scientific endeavour (close to the earth) and on the upward side, the perennial wisdom (up in the clouds). We needed to be centred in the fulcrum, making use of logic and empiricism on the downside and intuition and insight on the upside.

Edi took us through the view of the materialist scientists such as Crick, Dawkins, Wolpert, Greenfield and Maddox that on death the brain and therefore the epiphenomenon of consciousness dies. He then dealt with the viewpoint of the Mystic and the Enlightened Scientific Worldview, such as Vedanta, Taoism, Hermeticism, Einstein, Heisenberg, Paull, Schrodinger, Eddington, Stewart, Josephson and Sherrington, which teaches that on death the consciousness does not die. In this way he led us to the conclusion that death is a transition. He spoke of a stream of water in which there are vortexes. Our lives are the vortices, they come and go in the great stream of consciousness.

Ervin Laszlo has given plenty of evidence of consciousness which proceeds beyond the brain and Edi commented that the phenomenon of an Immortal Soul is no longer inconsistent with what we know from science about consciousness. Notions about individual responsibility during our life journey were voiced as there is such absolute uniqueness and individuality found in all creatures, and for our purposes, in human beings. The idea of resonance was brought up in connection to consciousness, for example, the Sufi teaching of a resonance between two souls. Almost every musician is drawn to one or other of the great composers. Edi ended with the question of why there is resonance in the first instance. It was realized that we are all linked with everyone else much as the vortexes in the stream are all still part of the stream.

Report of Meeting 1st March 2011

It was indeed a privilege to be gathered once more at our hosts' residence, David and Jean Ingman, in northern Sydney's Killarney Heights for a presentation by SMN's Programme Director, **David Lorimer**, during his Australian tour for the Theosophical Society. The topic chosen was 'Knowing We Will Die – How Should We Live?' A report of the talk follows by **Jean Ingman.**

David started his talk by telling us the inscription on the tomb of one of his ancestors which was 'I have seen the works of the Lord, now it is your turn to behold them and rejoice.' David said he would like 'Philosopher' on his tombstone. This led into the realisation that life is precious and existence a privilege. For David the wake-up call about the seriousness of a personal search for the meaning of life came in his twenties. He read widely, particularly Emanuel Swedenborg, the mystic and scientist.

David talked about two books he had written, the first, 'Survival', was regarding the history of mind, body and death and what the traditional cultures say about these. He said that evidence depends on what prior experience we have had. There are two notions of evidence, scientific and legal. He then discussed Out of Body Experiences and how they have been established beyond doubt. In addition, he talked about Near Death Experiences and the number of case histories which support the survival of death.

His second book was 'Whole in One' in 1990, in which he talks about two elements of NDEs, namely the Life Review and Cosmic Consciousness. There are many examples of life reviews from NDEs, both post-mortem and from the Sages. The evidence shows there are two levels of life review – the first being Panoramic Memory consisting of a flash back with pictures or holograms but no emotion. The second includes the deeper aspects of emotion especially with regards to how the emotions and experiences of



others are affected. David said every event in life has as many aspects as the number of people experiencing it.

David talked about empathetic resonance and how people pick up things about others when they are physically at great distances. He said that consciousness is non-local and mentioned one example of empathetic resonance in psychometry.

The Life Review we experience in death, David explained, shows how what we do affects others and also has secondary effects both positive and negative. The Life Review is an actualisation of the Golden Rule – What we do to one another we do to ourselves. David talked about Peter Deunov, a Bulgarian spiritual teacher and musician who emphasised the importance of Love, Wisdom and Truth, as also Swedenborg who also taught about Love and Wisdom. David said NDEs and Life Reviews are wake-up calls to unconditional love and wisdom.

David then opened the meeting to questions and a lively discussion ensued. Jo thanked David for his enlightening and no doubt sobering talk and reminded people that the new website for the Sydney group was now accessible at <www.smnsydney.org> and that the next meeting is on 12th June with Lloyd Fell as the speaker. The meeting ended with further conversation over supper.

On a cold and dark evening in December by the fire, Katriona Munthe invited us to reflect on the life of John of the Cross and his *Dark Night of the Soul*. We then celebrated the occasion with mulled wine and seasonal food

January: At the first meeting of 2011 **Keiron Le Grice** talked about his book *The Archetypal Cosmos: Rediscovering the Gods in Myth, Science and Astrology.* Keiron is adjunct Professor in the Philosophy, Cosmology and Consciousness programme at the California Institute of Integral Studies (CIIS) and is also the founding co-editor of Archai: The *Journal of Archetypal Cosmology.* The new discipline of Archetypal Cosmology uses the archetypal attributes of the 10 planets in astrology to create a framework by which to understand the events that shape us and the world around us, within the micro and the macro picture. His work is inspired by the writings of CG Jung, Grof, Hillman and Joseph Campbell and from a scientific perspective by the work of Rupert Sheldrake, Fritjof Capra, Teilhard de Chardin, Brian Swimme and David Bohm.

The book came out of his own need to understand his worldview and his work resonates strongly with that of R. Tarnas who is a colleague at the Institute. In his book Keiron looks at the human need for meaning and the role of myths in this regard. He quotes Campbell who examined both oriental and occidental myths and describes how they gave rise to meaning in the various cultures. In the West when Nietzsche declared God was dead he was communicating his experience of the prevalent demise of meaning. Shortly after however Jung gave the world the gift of his insights, including that of archetypes and individuation helping us again to reconnect with meaning. Archetypes inform nature as well as psyche and if we consider that the Cosmos is the materiality of Psyche and Psyche the interiority of the Cosmos we see that inner and outer are subject to the influences of archetypes. And that is Keiron's message. The ten planets are singular in their archetypal meaning and Keiron proposes that personal as well as world and even cosmic events are influenced by these archetypes and their astrological configurations. This perspective imputes meaning to the Cosmos. Using the same archetypal attributes used in personal astrology, Archetypal Cosmology is concerned with the Anima Mundi, the interiority of the Universe.

In February **Prof Bernard Carr**, Chair of the SMN, gave a presentation which attracted a record audience! People were sitting on the stairs to listen to his talk on *The Riddle of Time and New Dimensions of Reality*. Bernard is Professor of Mathematics and Astronomy at Queen Mary, University of London and has a deep interest in consciousness. He brings together his professional and personal interests by aiming to extend physics to incorporate consciousness and associated mental, psychical and spiritual phenomena. Bernard started by stating that only recently has consciousness become respectable within physics yet a brief examination of quantum theory, the anthropic principle, paranormal phenomena or the flow of time shows that mind is not incidental, but fundamental to understanding the nature of the universe in which we live. To show the interconnection between mind and physical reality,

he took us on an interesting tour around certain fundamental principles relating to space and to time.

Starting with space, we heard the history behind the suggestions of additional dimensions to the three (length, width and height) we are familiar with, proposed by various philosophers and scientists over the years. First four (spacetime), then six (superstrings), finally the 11 dimensions of current M-theory and we can of course not rule out the addition of more in the future. Against the background of these dimensions, can psi phenomena be explained as an interplay between mind and other dimensions? If we assume these are nonphysical spaces (as is the space in which we experience dreams, memory, or visualisation for instance) could a super-position of physical and non-physical spaces explain paranormal phenomena such as apparitions, ghosts, OBEs etc? To complete the picture Bernard addressed the riddle of time for which we need to know about specious time. This is the unit of time necessary for our consciousness to make sense of what we apprehend, in other words, the time duration necessary to apprehend the present moment. Specious time can vary in our own human experience, for instance in mystical experiences or in an accident, perception of time slows down sometimes almost to a standstill whereas when we have a fever or in an NDE life review it speeds up.

It is reasonable to suppose that specious time is different throughout the universe, where a whole hierarchy of consciousness may exist, however human consciousness is limited to what we can perceive in our – human – specious time. The understanding of potential existence of other dimensions and specious time together with the limitations of our consciousness to apprehend both space and time opens up a whole range of possibilities to explain that for which we currently don't have an explanation and therefore label 'paranormal'.

In March Dr. Peter Bowman, Science Coordinator for the University Preparatory Certificate at the Language Centre of UCL, and an enthusiastic student of Vedanta philosophy gave a very interesting talk on a side of Erwin Schrödinger (1887-1960) 1933 Nobel Prize winner in physics, little known to some of us. He entitled the talk Erwin Schrödinger and the Biological Basis of Consciousness and started by pointing to a survey in 2005 commissioned by the journal Science, which tried to identify the top 125 questions in science. Top of the poll was 'what is the universe made of?' and second came 'what is the biological basis of consciousness?' Looking at the latter through the lens of Schrödinger's ideas was the essence of this talk. Peter started by telling us that Schrödinger, had a deep understanding that materialist explanation go only part of the way to explain Reality and he set himself the task of resurrecting metaphysics. He wanted to engage in philosophical wonder, the wonder and astonishment at the way things are ordinarily. As well as Kant and Schopenhauer, Schrödinger studied Vedanta and this philosophy became the lens through which he understood the world. He had a profound sense that our consciousness is the singular manifestation of the oneness of Mind, best understood in the idea that Atman is Brahman.

Schrödinger, a brilliant scientist used physics and chemistry amongst others to study biology at a time in which genes were known biologically but scientists did not know how it works. He foresaw DNA and set the agenda for the understanding of genetics. But ultimately the question remained - if everything can be explained through physics and chemistry, what does that make me? Something is being left out. I must be more than just physical elements and chemical reactions! Perhaps I am a unique collection of sensory experiences and memories, or the background or canvas on which they are collected. Are they personal or universal? He felt they must be universal, an idea which echoes the Christian belief -I am one with God, or in Hinduism Aham Brahmasmi - I am Brahman. But mainstream science is resistant to the top down approach to consciousness, preferring the bottom up, which explains consciousness as an epi-phenomenon of brain. Why is that? Schrodinger sought the answer to this question in Greek thought which proposes that the world can indeed be understood (rather than it being a mystery) and that the world is outer and objective.

The Greeks did not consider the inner world, they focused on the content of awareness rather than awareness itself which is where it differs from the Vedanta approach. Shankara, the Hindu philosopher wrote a commentary on the Brahma Sutra, the culmination of Vedanta knowledge, and Schrödinger may have come across the recent translation by Max Muller. This text clarifies the difference between I and the **not** I, the cause of much confusion. The I, is the observer, awareness, the subject and the **'not** I' - that which is being observed, the content of awareness, the object. The subject of science is the Witness, everything else is object. Consciousness is

therefore the I, the subject, which cannot be the object of science. Science can therefore not examine consciousness because consciousness is the subject. The question therefore – what is the biological basis for consciousness, is clearly put on its head!

A 'wine and nibbles' social transitioning into a masterful performance by Professor Nick Clements on the theme: 2012, *The confluence of two rivers; Shamanism and Science.* Nick's presentation reflected his personal irrepressible attitude to life, of giving and learning, helping and showing, leading and integrating and making it serious and fun. His own life story of transition and change might make a good film; his work on different 'rites of passage' in the transition from youth to adulthood for young men in disrupted circumstances has undoubtedly saved many from a life on the very margins of society and helped other attain a fulfilling and productive life.

Oxford Group

January 25th 2011 saw the second gathering of the newly-minted Oxford Local Group. Like the first, it was well attended, with 26 people turning up at our room in the Mitre, close by the Carfax, this time to hear a presentation by **Andrew Powell**. Andrew will be known to many SMN members, having been a council member of the Network. He has had an impressive career in psychotherapy, having served at the Maudsley and St. George's hospitals in London, and in the NHS in Oxford until 2000. He has a long-standing interest in the influence of spiritual dynamics on physical and psychological wellbeing and is Founding Chair of the Spirituality and Psychiatry Special Interest Group (SPSIG) of the Royal College of Psychiatrists. Information on Andrew's publications can be found on SPSIG's website archive at www.rcpsych.ac.uk/spirit .

Andrew gave an extensive powerpoint presentation on 'Furthering the Spiritual Dimension of Psychiatry' in his trademark calm and clear manner that riveted the audience. He commenced by making important distinctions between religion and spirituality (which many people often fail to make). He pointed out that religion is an organised system of beliefs and rituals while spirituality is the personal dimension of the quest for higher understanding that 'may (or may not) lead to or arise from the development of religious rituals'. He then went on to define health as 'a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being, not merely the absence of disease', remarking that the usual idea of health as entertained by medical professionals is a somewhat reductionist, mechanistic one, focusing on medicines and surgery and considering patients simply

as material bodies. He opined that this was unsatisfactory, saying that elements such as faith, hope and compassion were also necessary to the healing process.

Andrew reviewed early traditions of healing, ranging from shamanism to Eastern metaphysics and the metaphysical beliefs of Western Antiquity before going on to show how the 18th-century scientific Enlightenment ushered in reductionist approaches that have inevitably affected the practice of medicine as well, including the treatment of mental illness, which formed the main part of Andrew's presentation. He gave a thoroughgoing account of the history and development of the treatment of the mentally ill, too detailed to even adequately summarise here, showing it had been affected by the attitudes of the Christian Church, and how there had been some early periods of humanitarian treatment punctuating less kindly approaches. He described the establishment of psychiatry and the medicalisation of mental illness.

Finally, he stated that we were in the midst of a 'spiritual emergency' with burgeoning mental health problems and argued that a more positive correlation between spirituality and mental health was needed, outlining the work and objectives of the SPSIG. Going forward, he said that we needed to alert clinicians to the profound shifts going on in within science, such as in quantum physics, cosmology, and so forth, and that there was need for more research into the effectiveness of psycho-spiritual therapy. He was at pains to point out, though, that it was not an 'either/or' situation, and that physical treatments for mental illness, if appropriately delivered, were still necessary, especially in severe cases.

The presentation generated a lively Q&A session.

SMN Yorkshire

In 'A Bridge to Spirituality' **Jim Lyons** suggested that number theory and dowsing made a bridge between spirit and matter. The dowsing of all kinds of different structures, both artificial and natural, reveal systematic patterns that can be analysed mathematically. Underground water, cathedrals, ley lines, and neolithic stone circles all reveal fundamental patterns of energy that are often nested one inside the other like Russian dolls. This pattern is the toroidal wave. Its rotation gives the sphere, and group number theory can suggest that the pattern of sub atomic energy fits into the same scheme. The 1/3rd charge of the quark and the Fine Structure Constant all fit into this scheme.

Matter can be understood as curled up space, and thus the energies of matter appear to fit into a harmonic pattern which recalls a Pythagorean vision of harmony. Dowsing can have an interface with science. Dowsers can detect variations in the earth's electrical field which then can be checked electronically, but dowsers use their minds to dowse. How is that neolithic people constructed their henges with such abstruse mathematical precision? It must have been that they saw the energies they were tapping. This is a power of vision largely lost by modern man. Science, spirituality and religion are usually seen to be in conflict. This new interpretation of energy structures takes the issue of mind and matter from a new perspective and suggests a solution to old conflicts.

After lunch **Morgan Barke** gave a talk on 'Multidimensional Listening and the High End of Hi Fi'. Starting from the technological and financial complexities of modern state of the art Hi Fi equipment, he went on to explain that it produced sounds which were beyond the range of normal human hearing: sub-sonic below the normal threshold, and hyper-sonic above. Strangely hyper-sonic sound is registered though it is not heard. The question is how? Experiments show that such awareness does not come through the ears, and if registered, hyper-sonic sound may be working through the sub-conscious mind. Furthermore the degree of conscious attention nevertheless increases the perception of the signal conveyed by hyper-sonic sound.

This raises the whole issue of the relation between the mind and digital electronic systems. The Princeton University (PEAR) experiments showed that conscious choices can effect random number generators., irrespective of time & space. If so, mind has access to quantum space, which is something beyond every day space and time. This may explain the ecstatic state of mind attained when the listener is totally lost in the music and feels that he is the music. This may be psychic space in which musical composition occurs.

David Loye author Darwin's Lost Theory (4 pp.)

Darwin would have been delighted with this splendid update for the work of so many of his aspirational offspring. Fears of Compassion: Development of three self-report measures *Paul Gilbert, Kirsten McEwan, Marcela Matos and Amanda Rivis* (17 pp., from *Psychology and Psychotherapy: Theory, Research and Practice (2010)*,

There is increasing evidence that helping people develop compassion for themselves and others has powerful impacts on negative affect and promotes positive affect. However, clinical observations suggest that some individuals, particularly those high in self-criticism, can find self-compassion and receiving compassion difficult and can be fearful of it. This study therefore developed measures of fear of: compassion for others, compassion from others, and compassion for self. We also explored the relationship of these fears with established compassion for self and compassion for others.

New International EMF Alliance Announces Far-reaching Scientific Consensus Statement

Oslo, Norway, February 3, 2011. The International EMF Alliance (IEMFA) today announces a new published report and scientific Consensus Statement concerning health hazards of electromagnetic fields (EMFs). Led by Olle Johansson, PhD of the Karolinska Institute, the report published by a consortium of international scientists urges global governments to adopt significantly lower human exposure standards for electromagnetic fields. The recommendations are based on the latest body of evidence in biological sciences, and the public-health implications of the unprecedented global exposures to electromagnetic fields from telecommunications and electric power technologies. The scientists recommend specific exposure limits for different frequency fields, including microwaves, used in wireless communications, and ELF electric fields and magnetic fields.
