Not everyone is going to be thrilled about the prospect of their consciousness continuing after death; in fact, many will be downright terrified! We will need education and support networks, using existing ones where possible, and a means of giving guidance. This is where the less academic members of the Network such as myself could play a role. We may not be brilliant scientists, but we may have other useful skills.

I personally think that contemporary philosophy now has in place all that is needed for a modern faith based on the emerging picture of a sort of psychic / divine 'Internet' pervading the Universe and on evolution of consciousness through many lifetimes.
